Read the MOTH AND MOON poem on page 4-5. Listen out for the 'th' sound. Say a few words that had the 'th' sound in them. Practise writing the grapheme: th. Now segment and blend a few words: this, that, then, with. Draw a picture of the moth and the moon and label it.	Practise all the sounds learnt this week. Write the letters, write short words and try to read them.  Parents/carers: you can say a word and ask children to fill in with the missing sounds. You can use cards with the sounds learnt so far, including the previous weeks.

Wiggly Worm is hair obsessed, But worms do not have hair. Thus, she has a wavy, woven Wig she likes to wear.


But that wig gets dirty When she tunnels through the ground. Thus, she'll whack it in the wash And watch it spin around.




Don't worry worm, your wavy wig Will soon be nice and clean Once it's had a thorough wash In your washing machine!

She spins and whizzes through the sky.


The moth and the moon, they play, have fun.




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


