Partial	<p>During the staff consultation, I was surprised that wet dreams had been taken out as there may be some older pupils within the school who have started to go through puberty who then may not understand exactly what is happening to them (Y5/6). I am assuming in this case, it will be up to the child to speak to their parent/guardian. However, some children may not feel comfortable asking adults at home or may be given incorrect/non scientific information.</p> <p>I agree that conception can be taken out of Year 5 and taught solely in Year 6.</p> <p>I believe in the PDM, there was one year group where the word breasts had been taken out (please correct me if I'm wrong)- seemed strange as they are a visible body part (of course covered by clothing) and spoken about/seen in families e.g. breastfeeding</p> <p>Otherwise, I was happy with the changes.</p>
Partial	<p>Language removed from lower year groups could still be beneficial from a scientific point of view and a CP point of view, if chn are having to discuss experiences/ allegations accurately. I do not understand why the statement about 'I fancy and girl am I gay' being removed when we are teaching all walks of life, points of view and tolerance, plus a lesson about being trans is taught in Year 6.</p>
Partial	<p>Terminology in Year 1 being removed may cause issues higher up the school (eg: breasts - for when we talk about breastfeeding and animals. Testicles - why is this not being taught as this is a part of the male anatomy and should not be missed off. Anus - this is technical term as they will learn this in Year when talking about digestion. Also for safeguarding reasons, shouldn't bottom and anus be different.)</p>
Partial	<p>Testicles, anus and breasts to be looked at to be included in Year 2.</p>
Partial	<p>For year 5, the material to be covered almost invites the question 'How does the sperm get to the egg?' Is it permitted to explain that that question is outside the remit of year 5, then referring them to their parents? I am aware we need to be very careful in teaching this topic.</p>
Partial	<p>Deletion of breast in Yr 1, children are exposed to this from when they are born , Wet dreams in Yr 6 is involuntary they need this to be explained I think</p>
