#### WHAT SHOULD YOU DRAW?

Wherever we live, nature is all around. Encourage pupils to go out for an adventure with their families to see what nature has to offer in the local area. Pupils can also draw a special memory of nature from a recent holiday around Britain or from a different season.

#### EXAMPLES OF DESIGNS COULD INCLUDE:

Animals or insects e.g., squirrel, foxes, stag beetles, dragon flies Lakes, rivers, canals or coastlines e.g., River Thames, Royal Docks (with nature focus) Vibrant flowers or mighty trees e.g., bluebells, English oak tree Rolling hills or awe-inspiring views e.g. Beckton Alps, The Greenway, Beckton Park, or further afield. Wherever your British Nature Walk takes you, draw it!

Be big, bold and colourful! Diversity and originality are key to standing out from the crowd! WOW badges are only 3cm, so simple designs without small details in them work best! Trademarks or logos must not be used, Winning designs will be digitally recreated, so pupils can use pencil, crayons or pens.

In the last couple of decades, the volume of online traffic has increased exponentially - but, by and large, people's awareness of the accompanying risks hasn't grown along with it. To illustrate the scale of the issue, consider this: a report by the Internet Crime Complaint Centre found that, in the US



during 2020, there was a successful cyber-attack every second. Yes: every second.

Criminals continue to find new and devious ways to attempt to hijack our online transactions and harvest our private information. To them, the smart devices that many of us now use as standard at home are simply a convenient back door into our lives – and our networks. #### Home Fire Safety Checker/Home Fire Safety Visits

A fire can start in any room and the effects can be devastating, even a small fire in your home can lead to substantial damage and expensive repairs. The London Fire Brigade want to stop fires from happening and that is why we offer our on-line Home Fire Safety Checker/free Home Fire Safety Visits to help keep you and your loved ones safe.

Home Fire Safety Checker

If you just want to check the fire safety of your home, our new Home Fire Safety Checker tool allows you to carry out a thorough check of your home in only a few minutes – so there's no need to wait for a visit. Go to: <u>https://www.london-fire.gov.uk/home-fire-safety-checker</u>

#### What happens during a Home Fire Safety Visit?

Our firefighters or trained staff will visit you at home, at a time that suits you and carry out a risk assessment. They will give you advice based on your home and individual needs, this includes; information on how to prevent fires, the importance of smoke alarms to detect a fire and your escape plan in the event of a fire.

A visit can take up to 90 minutes or longer if needed and we will fit free smoke alarms if required. Specialist alarms can be fitted for people who may have a delayed response to escape for example; strobe light and vibrating pad alarms for those who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Your neighbours are delivering great projects in your area. Come and meet them and celebrate positive change in your neighbourhood.




In 2022, residents applied for a share of £100,000. Residents submitted project proposals. You voted for your favourites. Now they are well underway on delivering those projects.

#### Come to Newham Libraries this half-term to create a code that may be shown in space

This Pebruary half-term, Newham Libraries is taking part in Mission Zero.

Minision Zero offers young people the chance to have their code run in space/ Write a simple program to take a reading from the colour and barenosity sensor on an Astro Pi computer on board the international Space Station, and use it to set the background colour in a personalized image for the astronauts to see as they go about their digit tasks.

Choose one of our sessions to take part in. At each session we'll code and run emulators to submit to the Mission Zero project. Your child's code may run for the astronauts on the international Space Station.
